Trash, Recycling, and Yard Waste!

TRASH AND RECYCLING CHANGES

- The following holidays will affect the trash and recycling changes.
- July 4, 2019: All days will be shifted forward. Trash usually picked up on Tuesday, July 2, will be picked up on Monday, July 1, Trash picked up on Wednesday, July 3, will be picked up on Tuesday, July 2, and Recycling will be picked up on Wednesday, July 3.
- Thanksgiving, November 28, 2019: Recycling normally picked up on November 28 will be picked up on Monday, December 2.
- The weeks of December 23 and December 30 will follow the schedule below.

A MESSAGE FROM PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR DEREK SHREVES

During the summer months—and year-round—property owners in the Town of Sykesville are responsible for keeping the public right-of-way clear from overgrown vegetation, including bushes, shrubs and trees (ORD §60-9, §60-11). Overgrown vegetation in the right-of-way is a hazard to pedestrians on sidewalks and motorists on roadways.

These obstructions may have numerous consequences:

- Obstructions over the sidewalk affect pedestrians and obstructions into the roadway affect vehicle traffic.
- Some overgrowth obstructs traffic signals or signs, creating a roadway hazard.

The sidewalks must be kept clear for all pedestrians. On Town streets, the right-of-way is typically defined from edge-of-sidewalk to edge-of-pavement. For properties without sidewalk, the right-of-way begins at the edge of the property line.

Trees overhanging roadways must also be trimmed such that a minimum clearance of 13 feet 6 inches over the pavement is maintained.

If a property's vegetation obstructs the right-of-way, the Town may notify property owners of the obstruction advising they must correct it immediately. If a property owner fails to clear the obstruction, the Town may take action to clear the vegetation for the property owner, who will then be subject to fines and fees related to the violation and cost of clearing.

Yard waste pickup continues through December 5. Place yard waste either in brown craft paper yard bags or bundle sticks together no more than 4 feet long.

PLASTIC BAGS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

PLASTIC BAGS ARE NOT ACCEPTED IN CURBSIDE RECYCLING.

All recycling should be loose in the bin. You can recycle plastic bags at local grocery stores.

Plastic bags will not be picked up in curbside recycling.



THE DOWNTOWN SYKESVILLE CONNECTION IS WORKING ON BRINGING YOU A PARKLET!

What is a parklet?

A parklet is a small public sidewalk extension, usually extending multiple parking space lengths, that uses non-permanent materials (e.g., it is not concrete). It combines elements such as seating, trees, flowers, shrubs, umbrellas, bike parking or lighting that reflect the unique character and needs of the location. Parklets are intended to provide space for people to sit, relax and enjoy the environment around them, especially where narrow sidewalks would otherwise preclude such activities. They are intended to be seen as a piece of street furniture, providing aesthetic enhancement to the overall streetscape. By not requiring a permanent concrete base, parklets are a much faster and less expensive way to bring sidewalk improvements to a community. Unlike traditional sidewalk widening, which is designed, programmed and paid for by the State and County, parklets are designed, paid for and maintained by a non-Town, County or State entity. Often a retail business owner or adjacent property owner hosts and sponsors the parklet. In this case, the DSC is sponsoring the parklet.

What are the Benefits of a Parklet?

There is no question we have narrow sidewalks in Sykesville and, therefore, limited space to linger over conversation, ice cream, or a perfect weather day. While parklets are foremost intended as an asset for the community, their presence has also been shown to increase foot traffic and revenue for adjacent businesses.

What is the Impact on Parking?

Parklets have a desired minimum width of 6 feet (or the width of the parking lane). Parklets generally entail the conversion of one or more parallel parking spaces or 3–4 angled parking spaces, but may vary according to the site, context, and desired character of the installation. Our parklet is planned to be installed in the four angled parking spaces on the corner of Main Street and Sandosky Road from June to September. Parking is a hot topic in Sykesville and has been an ongoing discussion for many years. The Mayor and Town Council and the Downtown Sykesville Connection take very seriously that parking needs to be at the forefront of any conversation surrounding growth and economic development. The merchants on Main Street, the Mayor and Town Council, as well as, the Planning Commission have all given their approval for this parklet as impact studies available on parklets across the US show strong evidence that the benefits of parklets outweigh temporarily repurposing 4 parking spots. Think of the parklet as gained "people spaces" instead of lost parking spaces.

What are the Plans for the Sykesville Parklet?

DSC's projects are meant to bring Sykesvillians together. The Parklet was no exception and community involvement started at the conceptual phases with Stacy Link's (Town Council, Historic District Commission) leading site review and design concept. The project piqued the curiosity of Pat Browne of Thomas & Son Woodwork, and his colleague Will Brenner, both Sykesville residents. The parklet was born of their ingenious creativity that combined tin roof material, reclaimed wood and pallets to create a space that belonged in our quaint and charming Town.

The Parklet will be set across the 4 parking spots at the intersection of Main Street And Sandosky Road for the summer months. It will be the ideal spot to enjoy a jar of Kombucha, a coffee or an ice cream, in the shade of the trees lining St Joe's church, lulled by the tunes of the Main street speakers.
