TRASH AND RECYCLING CHANGES 2020

Veterans Day – November 11 – trash regularly picked up on Wednesday, November 11, will be picked up on Friday, November 13

Thanksgiving - November 26 - recycling regularly picked up on Thursday, November 26, will be picked up on Monday, November 30

Christmas Eve – December 24 – recycling regularly picked up on Thursday, December 24, will be picked up on Monday, December 28.

There is no change to pick up on New Years' Eve, December 31.

YARD WASTE

- The Town will pick up yard waste on your regular trash day. It will occur after trash pick up
- Carroll County prohibits yard waste from being mixed with standard household refuse
- Yard waste pick up will begin on April 7, 2020 and will end on December 2, 2020
- Please have your yard waste in the brown yard bags or bundle sticks together no more than 4 feet long
- Yard waste must be placed in paper lawn bags
- Plastic bags will not be picked up
- Dumping of yard waste in the parks and other wooded areas in the Town or along the Linear Trail is prohibited

GRASS TRIMMING

- Remember to keep your grass trimmed to less than 12 inches
- Do not put grass trimmings in the street



STORM DRAINS

rass clippings and yard waste that gets into storm drains causes many problems. The clippings will break down in the storm drains and the nutrients released can be harmful to the water quality. The clippings can also clog the drains, potentially causing storm drain failure and flooding.

PLASTIC BAGS ARE NOT ACCEPTED IN CURBSIDE RECYCLING.

A ll recycling should be loose in the bin. You can recycle plastic bags at local grocery stores.

Sykesville Police Department

It is our sincere hope that, by the time that this newsletter is published, our country will be emerging from the grips of the COVID-19 pandemic. It has certainly wreaked havoc on our nation, state, and even here locally in our town.

We are hoping that life, as we know it, will return to some level of normalcy. With that being said, the Sykesville Police Department urges residents return to safe driving habits. During the height of the Coronavirus, with unprecedented numbers of people working from home and unemployment hitting levels not seen in this country since the Great Depression, traffic volumes fell dramatically.

Emptier streets and highways resulted in a significant surge in reports of drivers reaching speeds of 100 miles per hour or more in major cities and less populated ones, according to CNN (April 17, 2020). This increase in speed is not only a threat to the drivers and other motorists, but particularly to pedestrians, which we have our share of here in Town. "If you are a pedestrian and you get hit at 25 mph, you've got about a 90% chance of survival. It drops to 35% when you're hit at 40 miles per hour (Guckert, Maryland Matters, April 26, 2020)".

We strongly urge our residents to return to "normal" safe driving habits as the traffic volume increases during our nation's recovery from the Pandemic. Our officers will be out in force actively patrolling our roads in an effort to enforce traffic laws here in Town.

In addition, we will continue to stage our mobile radar speed trailer at various locations in Town in an effort to determine those locations which require focused enforcement of speeding and aggressive driving. We urge you all, for the safety of our residents, children, and pets, to please abide by the speed limit, wear your seat belt, and refrain from distracted driving and driving under the influence of alcohol.

Please continue to report any dangerous drivers, as well as any suspicious persons or vehicles in and around town at unusual hours, to us at 410-795-0757.

A MESSAGE FROM COUNCIL MEMBER LINK

My previous newsletter correspondences have been born out of my passion for a safer, cleaner, and more enduring environment and what it means to be good stewards of our natural resources and protectors of Mother Earth. Amidst all of the awfulness and trials dealt to us these last few months, I believe it might be prudent, if not at least temporarily relieving, to focus on some positive outcomes of our unfamiliar routines and to be aware of an unintended consequence of all this social distancing.

I've seen for the first time not just one but both a male and female yellow-shafted flicker. There are at least three red-bellied woodpeckers that have taken up residence in my neighbors' black walnut trees, and the Eastern bluebirds have returned threefold of last year's count. Now if only I could refill my feeder quickly enough to serve the booming cardinal and blue jay population on Spout Hill

But as our bird population is seemingly soaring and air quality has been reportedly improving worldwide, our Main Street's health and wellbeing has been suffering. Ed McMahon, Chair of the National Main Street Center Board of Directors, has said that "Downtown is important because it is the heart and soul of a community. And if you don't have a healthy downtown, you simply

don't have a healthy town." It's the collective success of our small businesses that provides the oxygen needed for our desirable quality of life and lends itself to our strong property values. Our total property assessment, the combined values of all residential and commercial property in Sykesville, has gradually increased \$12-16 million each year since 2015. Coincidentally, 2015 is the first year of five consecutive years that we have touted no store-

Investment in our downtown is an investment in our strong property values. Strong property values are what make a town attractive to home buyers in the hunt for a place with a sense of community. Town pride is contagious and lends itself to social engagement, fosters neighborly support, and volunteerism which cyclically promotes an even stronger community. Strong property values optimize the equity in your home. Strong property values afford low crime, education, and opportunities for our youth. Strong property values mean fewer vacant homes and negligible derelict properties which makes your property more likely to sell quickly when it is time for you to do so.

Unless, perhaps you can't part with what I know will be another unintended consequence of this trialing time: an even stronger sense of an even stronger community... and Eastern blue birds.

It was tough. Tough to see so much work vanishing, so many of our community struggling with access to food, resources or programs' and funds' eligibility and availability. It was tough to see our favorite places to meet or shop closed. It was tough to be alone, sheltered, and not knowing what to expect.

But there was some good as well. We met new and great partners at the Freedom District Citizen Association (FDCA), got some amazing work done with Commissioner Ed Rothstein and Senator Katie Fry Hester.

There was so much laughter, full on belly laughter, awarding the prizes for the "Disco-rona Dance Off" videos (still available on our website). There was so much pride in the race for the Best Main Street in America Contest, after making the quarterfinals out of 160 entries. There were some deep and fruitful collaborations

with the Town of Sykesville to sustain our small Main Street businesses, until they can safely re-open, with a grant program. There were moments, in the eye of the storm, where we saw the true Main Street heroes rise. We learned so much about what we are capable of and what really matters.

And finally, there is still so much good to come, that will feel immensely better postpandemic:

We are working on ways to re-open the Downtown Sykesville Farmers' Market.

We have gorgeous pole flags about to the be hung downtown. We're working on a fabulous 2021 calendar of events and programs. We will start small gatherings at the community garden when deemed safe and organize our volunteer meetings very soon.

We are hosting a golf tournament in August, in memory of a great lady – Donna Carol Box – and to sustain our organization that suffered greatly this first quarter. The master planning process is being overseen by the Sykesville Planning Commission and a Citizens Advisory Committee to review and update the Town's 2010 Master Plan. The review and update cycle is critical to ensure the Plan and supporting zoning regulations are current and relevant to the community's vision and goals, and to provide a solid foundation for the community's future growth and sustainability. Recommendations in the Master Plan will also be framed around an implementation strategy that will help inform Sykesville's capital planning and budgeting, general expenditures relative to capital improvements, infrastructure investments, and general expenditures required to accomplish the visions and goals of the Plan.
