Infrastructure

MD851, more commonly referred to as Springfield Ave and Main Street, has, with some help from Senator Fry Hester, finally received State Highway Admin's full funding for the construction phase of storm water infrastructure improvements. The County will also be working on replacement and repair of water mains and sewer lines under Main Street and Spring-



field Avenue beginning in the spring, just ahead of the State's work. Cooperation between the Town, County and State continues so that interruption to services, disturbances in traffic and impacts to access are minimized. Residents and business owners who will be directly affected by the infrastructure improvements can expect to receive timely and direct communication regarding anticipated momentary interruptions in service while work is being done. In totality, the County and SHA projects should continue through 2022 with final resurfacing occurring in spring 2023. These improvements are a long time coming and desperately needed. And although the reality of them coming into fruition is exciting, I expect you'll hear me whistling "Patience" like it's 1989 as I roll into downtown next summer- windows down.

Sykesville Police Department

In hot pursuit... of two more of Sykesville's finest. We have two open police officer positions, thereby creating a method for promotions and growth in rank within our Department, while affording the establishment of two squads. Chief Spaulding and the entire SPD have our unwavering support, and we know that officer retention and recruitment are paramount to a sustainable department. I encourage you to be mindful that feeling safe is at the root of Sykesville's excellent quality of life.

Warfield

Iune marked three years since closing on the sale of Warfield to the current developers. On October 25th Warfield Investments, LLC came before the Council to begin discussion on their proposed revision to the development. This new proposal includes 527 more residential units, most of which are new construction (infill) of condominiums and town houses but also includes redevelopment of most of the remaining historic structures for rental units. These additional residential units are not inclusive of the previously approved 145 town homes that make up Sykesville's newest neighborhood, Parkside. This new proposal is in stark contrast to the original intent of the mixed use project and the Planned Employment Center zoning: new construction/infill development of commercial space, including a hotel and redevelopment of the historic structures for a mixture of commercial uses such as office, retail, service, research, institutional, light industrial, hospitality and recreational. There will be ample opportunity for public input regarding Warfield as the proposal works its way through the Planning Commission and Council processes. Dates, times and locations of public hearings on this matter will be widely advertised. In the meantime, I encourage you to "tune in" to the live streams of our Council and Planning Commission meetings, or play them back at your convenience via the Town of Sykesville's Facebook page.

evere weather can be both frightening and dangerous for travelers. Winter storms, bad weather and sloppy road conditions are a factor in nearly half a million crashes and more than 2,000 road deaths every winter, according to research by the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety. Drivers should know the safety rules for dealing with winter road emergencies. AAA urges drivers to be cautious while driving in adverse weather.

AAA recommends the following tips while driving in snowy and icy conditions:

COLD WEATHER DRIVING TIPS

- Keep a bundle of cold-weather gear in your car, such as extra food and water, warm clothing, a flashlight, a glass scraper, blankets, medications, and more.
- Make certain your tires are properly inflated and have plenty of tread.
- Keep at least half a tank of fuel in your vehicle at all times.
- Never warm up a vehicle in an enclosed area, such as a garage.
- Do not use cruise control when driving on any slippery surface, such as on ice and snow.

TIPS FOR DRIVING IN THE SNOW

- Stay home. Only go out if necessary. Even if you can drive well in bad weather, it's better to avoid taking unnecessary risks by venturing out.
- Drive slowly. Always adjust your speed down to account for lower traction when driving on snow or ice.
- Accelerate and decelerate slowly. Apply the gas slowly to regain traction and avoid skids. Don't try to get moving in a hurry and take time to slow down for a stoplight. Remember: It takes longer to slow down on icy roads.
- **Increase your following distance** to five to six seconds. This increased margin of safety will provide the longer distance needed if you have to stop.
- Know your brakes. Whether you have antilock brakes or not, keep the heel of your foot on the floor and use the ball of your foot to apply firm, steady pressure on the brake pedal.
- Don't stop if you can avoid it. There's a big difference in the amount of inertia it takes to start moving from a full stop versus how much it takes to get moving while still rolling. If you can slow down enough to keep rolling until a traffic light changes, do it.
- Don't power up hills. Applying extra gas on snow-covered roads will just make your wheels spin. Try to get a little inertia going before you reach the hill and let that inertia carry you to the top. As you reach the crest of the hill, reduce your speed and proceed downhill slowly.
- Don't stop going up a hill. There's nothing worse than trying to get moving up a hill on an icy road. Get some inertia going on a flat roadway before you take on the hill.

TIPS FOR LONG-DISTANCE WINTER TRIPS

- Be Prepared: Have your vehicle checked by a AAA Approved Auto Repair facility before hitting the road.
- Check the Weather: Check the weather along your route and when possible, delay your trip if bad weather is expected.
- Stay Connected: Before hitting the road, notify others and let them know your route, destination, and estimated time of arrival.
- If you get stuck in the snow:
 - O Stay with your vehicle: Your vehicle provides temporary shelter and makes it easier for rescuers to locate you. Do not try to walk in a severe storm. It is easy to lose sight of your vehicle in blowing snow and become lost.
 - o Don't over exert yourself: When digging out your vehicle, listen to your body and stop if you become tired.
 - O Be Visible: Tie a brightly colored cloth to the antenna of your vehicle or place a cloth at the top of a rolled-up window to signal distress. At night, keep the dome light on if possible. It only uses a small amount of electricity and will make it easier for rescuers to find you.
 - O Clear the Exhaust Pipe: Make sure the exhaust pipe is not clogged with snow, ice or mud. A blocked exhaust pipe can cause deadly carbon monoxide gas to leak into the passenger compartment of the vehicle while the engine is running.
 - O Stay Warm: Use whatever is available to insulate your body from the cold. This could include floor mats, newspapers or paper maps. Pre-pack blankets and heavy clothing to use in case of an emergency.
 - O Conserve Fuel: If possible, only run the engine and heater long enough to remove the chill. This will help to conserve fuel.

Gate House Museum

the help of sturdy volunteers, we have shifted around exhibits to allow for greater foot traffic and accommodate walkers. This November, student service learners from Carroll County Public Schools are engaged in creating a virtual reality tour of the entire current exhibit space and nearby surroundings. In December, another group of students will be researching and 3D imaging artifacts from the museum—a program that has received more than five times the applications than our small house can accommodate. Our 1904 building has a plethora of accessibility challenges, but we are committed to making the history of Sykesville available to everyone—working on improving physical spaces and incorporating student group activity is just the beginning.

Of course, I am also new! My name is Adrienne Smith, and late this summer I was appointed curator of the Gate House. I have spent four years volunteering at the museum and researching historical sites of mental healthcare. Prior to moving to Sykesville, I was a public middle school social studies teacher in South Carolina, a private school social studies teacher in Silver Spring, MD, and most recently worked for Carroll County Department of Recreation and Parks as their volunteer coordinator. I hold a bachelor's degree in history, a master's degree in teaching, and am currently working on obtaining project management certifications. I look forward to meeting you all at the Gate House!
