Hello neighbors. Join me in welcoming another Fall to Sykesville. Some great things are happening here.



Have you seen it? It's finally here! The Town of Sykesville has a new website. I hope you'll visit it and find it way more user friendly and compatible for your smart phone use. Access to Town meeting recordings, community offerings, volunteer opportunities, information about our parks and services and elected officials are now just clicks away. From the new site, please sign up for news flashes about meetings, road closures and town events at our parks and museums. And there's more! I'm Syked to announce See-Click-Fix! You can access this tool from the new website's home page. Simply click on "Report a



Concern" or scan the QR code here. See-Click-Fix is your way to report a pothole, a street sign obstructed by overgrown foliage, a dangerous sidewalk-anything on public property that requires our attention. See it! Click it! We'll fix it.



I have coordinated another pumpkin drop-ff event with the Hatton Animal Rescue Foundation, an amazing group that homes, fosters and supports senior and special needs animals that would otherwise be left behind and typically deemed unsalvageable or un-adoptable due to their medical conditions and age.

November 5th, bring your carved jack-o-lanterns and whole pumpkins to Little Sykes Railroad Park 731 Sandosky Road and meet donkeys Paco Bell, Patty and Truffles. Pumpkins will be received from 11:30-2:30. The farm animals will thank you! (And so will I when our landfill tipping fees are reduced.)



Infrastructure work on Main Street is wrapping up after a grueling go of it with the County contractor replacing the main water line as well as relining the insides of the entire sewer system. Only after the County's work has completed, will the State's storm water drainage improvements get underway. The State's contractor will be replacing four storm drain inlets on Main Street. This work is to begin in November and is expected to take 30 days. Winter is coming so we shouldn't expect resurfacing/ paving efforts to begin until next Spring.

Springfield Avenue water and sewer work has finally been completed. The State's storm water drainage improvements will be ongoing until it gets too cold for concrete to cure and will pick back up in Spring 2024.

I know this has challenged your patience as it has mine and staff's. Our downtown business owners and residents have been bearing the brunt of it and have remained most gracious. I keep reminding myself this will all be worth it. Wonderful and truly generational things will follow these infrastructure projects. I can promise you that!

PREPARE YOUR CAR FOR WINTER

In addition to annual maintenance, here are some tips to winterize your car:

- Test your battery; battery power drops as the temperature drops
- Make sure the cooling system is in good working order
- Have winter tires with a deeper, more flexible tread put on your car
- If using all-season tires, check the tread on your tires and replace if less than 2/32 of an inch
- Check the tire pressure; tire pressure drops as the temperature drops
- Check your wiper blades and replace if needed
- Add wiper fluid rated for -30 degrees
- Keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid gas line freeze
- Have a fully charged cellular device with you during all winter weather trips, regardless of the length of the journey

Remember to keep your car's emergency preparedness kit fully stocked, too.

HOW TO AVOID A CRASH

AAA offers the following driving tips:

- Avoid using cruise control in wintry conditions
- Steer in the direction of a skid, so when your wheels regain traction, you don't have to over-correct to stay in your lane
- Accelerate and decelerate slowly
- Increase following distance to 8 to 10 seconds
- If possible, don't stop when going uphill
- Avoid all distractions while driving, to include hand-held cellular devices

If visibility is severely limited due to a whiteout, pull off the road to a safe place and do not drive until conditions improve. Avoid pulling off onto the shoulder unless it is an absolute emergency. Limited visibility means other vehicles can't see yours on the shoulder. If you must pull to the shoulder, activate your hazard lights and set out flares or other reflective/high visibility roadside markers to alert traffic of your position on the side of the road. Call the police to notify them of your location and the reason for pulling to the shoulder.

BEFORE YOU START OUT

- Clean your car's external camera lenses and side view mirrors so you'll be able to see what's around you
- Remove dirt, ice and snow from sensors to allow the assistive-driving features like automatic emergency braking to work
- In frigid weather, you may want to warm up the car before you drive it. However, be cautioned that thieves look for this opportunity to steal your vehicle
- To prevent carbon monoxide poisoning, never leave a vehicle running in your garage – even with the garage door up
- If the forecast looks iffy, wait out the storm if possible; if you must travel, share your travel plans and route with someone before you leave

As autumn approaches and the leaves start to fall, remember street drains are critical to keeping neighborhoods from flooding when it rains. Currently, the Town does not have a leaf collection program. It is your responsibility to make sure that nothing but untainted rainwater flows from your yard to the street and into storm drains. Lawn clippings, leaves, and other debris often clump together, contributing to flooding in your neighborhood. You can help prevent flooding with a few small maintenance actions on your property.

- Keep leaves and debris out of drains
- Avoid piling yard waste, such as fallen leaves on your property where it could wash into Town drains. Keep yard
 waste in craft bags or other containers.
- If the drains are still clogged after you've removed the debris, call the Town.

It is important to remember the Town storm drains run to retention ponds that eventually lead via streams and rivers to the Chesapeake Bay. As organic materials, such as grass clippings and leaves decompose, they release carbon and nitrogen. These chemicals feed undesirable algae which pull oxygen from the water, leading to fish kills. And that is only the beginning! If you have used chemicals on your lawn or garden, they may contaminate the water that runs off from rains or your sprinkler system. Perhaps you only occasionally allow grass clippings, leaves and other plants to wash down the drains, but multiply your "occasionally" by the hundreds of homes in the area, and it is easy to see why non-point source pollution is becoming a major concern. Yard waste is picked up the same day as your trash and will continue until the end of November. If you have concerns about your storm drains, please call the Town at 410-795-8959.
